

Besides the members of the SBRC possibly receiving high profits against generated revenue in the sale horse market at Heritage Place, they could also be generating increased revenue by the adoption of rules for the industry. One such SBRC adopted rule may be another example of increased revenue as a result of the adoption by the SBRC of the Multiple Embryo Transfer rule (which was a settlement agreed to in the Floyd v AQHA lawsuit), in which multiple foals out of a single mare born through multiple embryos in a single year can be registered by the AQHA.

**Mares with over 40 babies!**

My research shows that members of the Quarter Horse racing industry could be capitalizing on this rule by having mares produce foals far beyond their actual age capability. The above-linked article also shows that Trotter and the Burnett Ranch and its veterinarian and manager Dr. Glenn Blodgett, are again partners on Ms First Prize Rose, the winner of the \$1 million Rainbow Futurity.

Ms First Prize Rose comes from one of the most productive dam lines in the sport's history, going back to First Prize Dash, a full sister to all-time leading sire First Down Dash. The single most outstanding fact about First Prize Dash, a 1988 mare, is that she has had **42 offspring in 26 years**. She is owned by Weetona Stanley, Madill, Okla., who also owns or bred four of her daughters: Fast First Prize, **a 2000 mare with 32 offspring**; Fast Prize Doll, **a 2005 mare with 16 offspring**; Fast Mans Prize, a 2004 mare with 12 offspring and First Prize Robin, a 2004 mare with 10 offspring.
